Hello FPS Family!

The excitement is building with the anticipation of another school year. It has been a busy summer, and as you have probably noticed, there continues to be a lot of changes within our buildings. We know that we need to be flexible as the construction continues, but also realize it will all be worth it when it is complete! We are set to start school on September 6th. We won't know yet if we will have full access to the new area within the high school, but either way we will find a way to make it work! It seems strange starting after Labor Day because not many schools do anymore. I will say that it has been nice having some extra time in August, so hopefully we will remember this when June comes around!

Our staffing is currently set with all positions filled (with the exception of bus drivers). Everyone is working hard to prepare for the upcoming school year and to help ensure all students the opportunity for success. New high school student orientation is scheduled for August 24th at 6 pm and parents are encouraged to attend with their students.

I continue to meet periodically with the Health Department regarding COVID-19. While there are no mandates currently in place, we will continue to take steps to clean and sanitize as we have in the past. Also, as of now, there is no plan to do contact tracing this year. It is still important to monitor for symptoms and please stay home when you are sick!

Finally, I would like to let you know that I have applied for a rebate program through the Environmental Protection Agency for 4 electric school buses. This is a highly competitive program, so I have no idea how good our odds will be to receive anything. Because this program would provide the buses and needed infrastructure for their charging at no cost to the district, it is worth applying for. Mike Schmitt and I went to Gaylord to look at the 2 electric buses they have been using for the past two years and were quite impressed with what we saw. I will certainly keep you posted if we receive any positive news regarding this.

I hope everyone has a great start to the school year and I look forward to seeing all the smiling faces once again in the building!

School Lunch Program

We are so excited to start a new school year! FPS has updated "Meal Magic". Meal Magic is the payment program to put money in your student's school lunch account. This system is effective for the 2022-2023 school year.

Parents will need to register their account through the <u>family portal</u>: Click on Register, Accept the Terms, and following the instructions from there.

Lunch prices for the 2022-2023 school year are as follows:

- Breakfast K-8 \$1.75
- Lunch K-5 \$2.75
- Lunch 6-12 \$3.00





Since the State of Michigan will no longer implement free lunches to all students, it is important that you fill out a Free and Reduced Lunch Application. School Districts receive additional funding from the State for all applications submitted, so please fill one out. A link to instructions, eligibility requirements, FAQ, and the application are available on the FPS website.

School Security at FPS

I wanted to provide some information to you regarding a system that we have in place here in Fowler. The 'Smart Boot' is installed at Waldron and at the high school. It has been in use for approximately 4 years. Every classroom has a 'Boot' mounted on the wall by the door that, when pulled, automatically initiates a lockdown for the entire school building with flashing liahts and а continual 'lockdown' warning announcement. This 'Smart Boot' then is placed in two anchor spots mounted in the floor which makes that door virtually impenetrable. Once the lockdown is initiated, all classrooms secure their individual boots.

Fowler is one of only 2 schools in Clinton County to have this security feature installed. In addition to the quick barricade for all rooms, the ability to have a school-wide lockdown initiated from any of these locations allows a much larger response time to any possible threat. A yearbook is a publication that reflects the events and lives of people involved with a school during that given year. How do we get our yearbook?

Yearbook at FHS is a year-long course which is open to juniors and seniors only. Typically, 6-12 committed students apply for a yearbook staff position to be a part of this class. The yearbook staff puts in extensive hours both inside and outside of the school day to produce the high-quality yearbook that FHS students and parents have come to expect.

Fowler is on a "fall delivery" schedule with Jostens, our printing partner. The reason for a fall delivery is that it allows us to cover all of our students and sports equally, and gives the yearbook staff the opportunity to cover the entire school year in a single publication. Since many school events continue into May or even June, a fall delivery allows us to cover these events and include them in that year's yearbook.

Now, for the process:

<u>August</u>

- The yearbook staff roster is finalized and students receive their first emails from Mrs. Klamer on getting things started for the year.
- The previous school year's yearbook is delivered to FHS in mid- to late August. We check it over for accuracy and review our sales lists to prepare for distribution.

<u>September</u>

- Yearbooks are distributed to students on the second week of school. A limited number of books are available for purchase if a student did not prepurchase theirs during the school year.
- The new staff begins learning our design program and goes out in the community to sell ads to support the yearbook. Ads lower the student cost of each book by about 20-30% annually.
- Yearbook sales begin! The first 2 weeks of school are the best time to buy, with yearbooks discounted at the lowest possible rate and special bonus incentives are offered.

<u>October</u>

- Yearbook staff goes to work taking photos at school and sports events, and begins conducting interviews and writing creative copy to cover the events of the year.
- Student and staff photos are taken. Seniors may submit a senior photo from another photographer. (photos must be an indoor head and shoulder shot of a specific size.)

<u>November</u>

- Staff continues working on photos, copy, and pages. Fall sports pages are completed, as well as student class pages. The first deadline is fast approaching!
- Ad invoices are sent out.

December

- First yearbook deadline. Winter sports coverage and club coverage is well underway!
- Senior recognition ads are due!

<u>January</u>

- Yearbook prices increase. (Early purchase incentives end.)



BOARD POLICY ON MEDICATIONS

Before any medication or treatment may be administered to any student during school hours, the board shall require the written prescription from the child's physician accompanied by the written authorization of the parent. In cases where non-prescribed medication is necessary, the school may dispense such medication only upon proper authorization by the parent. These documents shall be on file in the principal's office.

Only medication in its original prescription bottle, labeled with the date of the prescription, student's name, and exact dosage will be administered. Staff of students authorized in writing by their physician and parents may administer medication or treatment, but only in the presence of another adult.

In cases where non-prescribed medications are necessary, the school may dispense such medication only upon the proper authorization by the parents.

Staff members are to administer medication or treatment only in the presence of another adult, except in the case of an emergency that threatens the life or health of the student.

> Civil Rights, Title VI, and Section 504 – Non-Discrimination Policy

As required by the federal government, the following notices are given to the community of Fowler Public Schools:

Civil Rights Compliance - The Fowler Public Schools, located at 11214 W Kent, Fowler, MI 48835, will receive and use federal funds and USDA donated foods. No person, because of race, color, national origin, sex, age or handicap, shall be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subject to discrimination in our United States Department of Agriculture donated food and child nutrition programs.

Non-Discrimination Policy – It is the policy of Fowler Public Schools that no person shall, on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry, sex, age, disability, height, weight, or marital status, be excluded from participation in, or be subjected to discrimination during any program, activity, or employment.

COMMUNICATION PROCESS

Questions, concerns and ideas routinely arise during the school year. This outline is provided to assist in communication with the appropriate person.

Step 1: Questions or concerns regarding instructional practices should go to the teacher first. A discussion should be scheduled with the principal if you still have questions after talking with the teacher.

Step 2: Questions or concerns should be directed to the administrator or director who has responsibility in the area of concern.

Step 3: A conference with the superintendent is most appropriately held if questions or concerns have not been adequately addressed at earlier levels.

Step 4: The final level of contact with the district about a question or concern is the Board of Education.

COMPLAINT/GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

Grievance/Complaint Procedures of the Title VI and Title IX of the Education Amendment Act of 1972 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973:

If any person believes that the Fowler Public School District, or any part of the school, has inadequately applied the principles and/or regulations of (1) Title VI of the Education Amendment Act of 1972, and (3) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, he/she may bring forward a complaint, to the local Civil Rights Coordinator, Neil Hufnagel, Fowler Public Schools, 11214 W Kent, Fowler, MI 48835.

The person who believes he/she has a valid basis for the complaint shall discuss the complaint informally with the local Civil Rights Coordinator. If unresolved, he/she may initiate formal procedures according to the following steps:

Step 1: A written statement of the complaint signed by the complainant shall be submitted to the local Civil Rights Coordinator.

Step 2: The coordinator shall further investigate the complaint and reply in writing to the complainant.

Step 3: If the complainant wishes to appeal the decision of the local Civil Rights Coordinator, he/she may submit a signed statement of appeal to the superintendent within (10) calendar days after receipt of the coordinator's response.

Step 4: The superintendent shall affirm or reverse the Civil Rights Coordinator's decision and, if warranted, implement the Civil Rights Coordinator's proposed resolution or a modification there of.

Step 5: If the complainant remains unsatisfied, he/she may appeal to the Office for Civil Rights, Department of Education, Washington DC 20202.

MMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

The following is a description of the immunization requirements as set by the Department of Education and the Department of Public Health.

See ww.mcir.org/forms/SS_School_Requirements.pdf 1. Ages 4-6: 4 doses of DTP or DTap (one dose must be on or after age 4); 4 doses of polio vaccine; 2 doses MMR vaccine on or after 12 months of age; 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine on or after 12 months of age OR reliable history of disease.

2. Ages 7-18, including all 6th graders: 4 doses D and T OR 3 doses Td if one given on or after age 7; 1 dose Tdap for ages 11-18 IF 5 years since the last dose of tetanus/diphtheria vaccine; 2 doses MMR; 3 doses Hepatitis B; 1 dose meningococcal for ages 11 or older upon entry into 7th grade or higher; 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine OR reliable history of dis-ease.

Current laboratory evidence of immunity is acceptable instead of immunization with antigen. All doses must be given with appropriate spacing and at appropriate ages. Tdap is required at 11 years of age or older regardless of

grade. When presented with anything but a medical or religious exemption from immunization requirements, the administrator must obtain the consent of the director of local public health office to recognize the exemption and admit the student. All parents are encouraged to review their child's immunization record. If records do not meet the requirements, please contact your family physician or the local department of public health.

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

Section 444 of the General Education Provisions Act is commonly referred to as The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act 20 U.S.C. 1232g (FERPA) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education. FERPA generally does not apply to most private elementary and secondary schools, as they do not typically receive U.S. Department of Education funding.

The educational interests of students require the collection, retention, and use of data about individuals and groups of students while ensuring individual rights of privacy. The school District will maintain educational records of students for legitimate educational purposes.

School records are confidential and information from them shall not be released except as provided by law. The information contained in school student records shall be kept current, accurate, clear, and relevant. The District may release directory information in accord with law, provided parent(s)/guardian(s) are given the opportunity to object to the release of this information. Directory information for this District includes the following information: the student's name, picture, major field of study, participation in recognized activities and sports and related information, grade placement, honors and awards received, and telephone number (for military recruiters only).

Directory information may be provided to persons or organizations for non-profit making purposes when deemed appropriate by the building principal, unless the parents of the student restrict the information in writing to the building principal.

The shall inform students District and their parent(s)/guardian(s) annually and upon initial enrollment of their rights under FERPA and Board policy with respect to student records, and of the procedures for exercising those rights. The Superintendent shall provide the appropriate training to all staff that has access to student records.

Pursuant to federal law, a form will be sent to parent(s)/guardian(s) that allow them to opt out of the disclosure of directory information to the military recruiters, and that informs the recipients that failure to complete and return the form will result in the disclosure of the information to military recruiters.

As provided in PA39, 2002 (MCL 380.1139) a school must provide armed forces recruiters and service academies with a student's name, address, and telephone number (if listed.)

The District shall protect the rights of privacy of students and their families in connection with any surveys or datagathering activities conducted, assisted, or authorized by the Board or Superintendent.

NOTIFICATION OF DESIGNATED EMPLOYEE AS TITLE VI, TITLE IX, AND SECTION 504 COORDINATOR

The federal government has made provisions to ensure that no person is discriminated against on the basis of sex, religion, race, color, national origin, age, height, weight, marital status or handicap. In order to protect these rights and assure compliance, the Fowler Public Schools has appointed Mark Horak as Coordinator of Title VI, Title IX, and Section 504.

INTEGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT PLAN (IPM)

The use of pesticides in schools must be done in accordance with an Integrated Pest Management Program which complies with Regulation 637, Rule 14 of the Michigan Pesticide Act, PA 171. The Fowler district IPM plan is in accordance with the state law and available to the public by requesting a copy from the superintendent's office. Each school building has a copy for reference for interested staff and students.

In brief, the IPM plan clearly defines the procedures necessary to apply pest control methods of school. The applicant must

use the following checklist:

- 1. Site evaluation
- 2. Inspection
- 3. Monitoring
- Determine pest biology
 Consider all available methods
- 6. Take action steps

Over the course of the school year, during appropriate application times, the maintenance department may apply a variety of pest control methods. If you live in close proximity of the school and wish to be notified of any applications, contact the superintendent's office at 989-593-2296 as soon as possible.

MCKINNEY-VENTO ACT

The McKinney-Vento program is designed to address the problems that homeless children and youth have faced in enrolling, attending, and succeeding in school. Under this program, State educational agencies (SEAs) must ensure that each homeless child and youth has equal access to the same free, appropriate public education, including a public preschool education, as other children and youth.

The program is authorized under Title VII-B of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 USC 11431 et seq.), (McKinney-Vento Act). The program was originally authorized in 1987 and, most recently, reauthorized by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

TOBACCO USE PROHIBITED

Michigan law prohibits smoking in all buildings owned by public schools around the state. This includes not only the classroom buildings, but also any other buildings such as bus garages, maintenance buildings, or administrative buildings.



NOTICE TO PARENTS ABOUT HUMAN SEXUALITY AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH CURRICULUM

The Board of Education has established a program of instruction in sex education. As a component of the sex education program, reproductive health is offered in identified courses.

According to law (PA 226 of 1977), parents have the right to review the materials to be used in these courses. The local board of education, in compliance with state statute, will make the materials available for parents to re-view. Any parent who wishes to do so may contact the high school at 989-593-2250 or Waldron at 989-593-2160 to make arrangements for review of the materials.

Students in grades 4-9 will be eligible to participate in these courses. By law, parents have the right to excuse their children from participation in the reproductive health portion of the class.

Any parent wishing to exercise his/her right to excuse a student without penalty from instruction in reproductive health should please send written no-tice to Waldron Elementary or Fowler High School, PO Box 408, Fowler, MI 48835 before the scheduled instruction time.

PERSONALLY, IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION

Public Law 93.390 states: "An education agency or institution may disclose personally identifiable information from the educational records of a student who is in attendance at the institution or agency if that information has been designated as directory information." (45CFR 99.37(a))

Accordingly, the following is designated as directory information with respect to all past and present students of the Fowler Public Schools:

1. Name

- 2. Participation in officially recognized activities and sports.
- 3. Dates of attendance.
- 4. Honors and rewards received.

5. The most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.

6. Yearbook pictures and school related photographs.

If you as a parent do not want this type of personally identifiable information made part of publicity, newsletters, yearbooks, and newspaper publications, please send a letter of notification designating the specific categories of directory information you do not want released with respect to your child.

In accordance with this law, a parent of a student currently in attendance in the Fowler Public Schools has ten (10) days from the date of this notice to notify the school district in writing.
